Dear Jim,

The Taoiseach, Mr. Lemass, has asked me to transmit the following message to you for Captain O'Neill, in reply to the latter's invitation as conveyed by you in person yesterday.

Mr. Lemass would be very pleased to go to Belfast for lunch on either Wednesday or Thursday of next week (January 13 or 14), whichever is the more convenient for your Prime Minister. He would propose to go by car in the morning, returning the same evening; only if the weather made it necessary would he travel by train. Mrs. Lemass would not be available to accompany the Taoiseach, who would propose to take me with him, if that is acceptable.

Mr. Lemass considers that, to avoid undue press speculation, the announcement of the visit should be made not before the previous night, so that it would appear in the newspapers only on the day of the visit. He has in mind an announcement as follows:

"The Taoiseach, Mr. Sean Lemass, T.D., will today meet Captain O'Neill, M.P., Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, in Belfast. They will discuss possibilities of practical co-operation in matters of mutual interest, such as tourism.

It is intended that Captain O'Neill will later visit
Dublin for further discussions."
