Johnstonethe British Embassy phoned this morning regarding the decision of Bernard Fox to come off his hunger-strike. Johnston said that Fox had been visited yesterday afternoon by a medical professor who told him that if he did not get treatment for his kidney ailment he would be dead within a week. Fox's family also visited him yesterday afternoon. Fox said that he would like to think about it and early yesterday evening a Prison Chaplain told the Governor that Fox would like to speak to the other hunger-strikers and with McFarlane. He was permitted to do this and the meeting took about two hours from 8-10. Johnstone said that during the course of this meeting and before it was clear that Fox had taken any decision about the continuation of his hunger-strike, Sinn Fein (or the H-Blocks Committee) let it be known to the media that Fox intended to end his protest (the British apparently considered this surprising).

Following Arequest for treatment Fox was moved to Musgrave Park hospital at 2.20a.m.
