I know there are many fine men and women in the UDR; I recognise the losses borne by the Regiment and I know the danger many serving and former UDR soldiers face as soft targets in some areas of Northern Ireland (179 killed).

Nonetheless the situation is so serious, and the pattern of misconduct and worse how so well established, that it is not credible to speak - as some do - of a few bad apples. The record is guite frightening and shows:

- at least 130 serious criminal convictions since 1970,
- 16 convictions for murder, many of them sectarian,
- 7 convictions for manslaughter,
- numerous thefts of weapons from army bases.
- 2. That was the record the Anglo-Irish Agreement sought to address. Both Governments knew in 1985, as they had known for a long time, that there was a fundamental problem to be addressed about the UDR. The core problem and let's be very frank related to the reasons and in particular the justification for the existence of a locally-recruited regiment in Northern Ireland.
- 3. At the time of the Agreement, the two Governments saw the grave threat the UDR issue posed for the successful conclusion of the negotiations and sought to respond to the problem in a number of ways. Despite our fundamental reservations, and in an effort to find a way forward, we, for our part, did not press for disbandment. In return, we were given commitments that a number of effective reforms would be introduced, including (a) improved training and discipline; (b) non-deployment in sensitive areas; and (c) in particular, accompaniment of the UDR by the RUC. However, the effect of the action taken has clearly been

inadequate and unsatisfactory and we are back again facing the same fundamental problem, but in a more acute form. I don't believe that it will now be ever possible to create any degree of confidence in the Regiment - and the 1985 Agreement was in very significant part about the establishment of confidence and cooperation.

- 4. Let me be more specific. Since 1985 we have had
 - in the period 1 January 1985 to 1 September 1989, 73 members of the UDR discharged or resigned having been convicted or involved in criminal offence;
 - in one period alone January 1986 to April 1988 28 members of the UDR convicted of murder or other serious crimes involving the use of firearms; we do not yet have more recent figures but it appears that the current rate of UDR convictions for serious violent crime is one per month;
 - as we speak, there are at least 3 serving members and two former members of the UDR before the courts on charges of four separate murders (Davis, Maginn, McKee, Patton).
- 5. I appreciate that I am raising very fundamental issues here today. But I do so in the certain knowledge that unless we tackle and take them on, we are inevitably going to progressively undermine, weaken and actually endanger the Agreement. Both Governments have committed too much with thankfully a considerable degree of success to take any such risk. This is why I feel we need to go back to the basic drawing board and assess calmly and comprehensively the very justification for the existence of the UDR, and the role allocated to it in security arrangements in Northern Ireland.

6. I appreciate also of course that you cannot be expected to respond today to the questions I have raised. In the first place, the UDR is not just an NIO responsibility. But I would like to propose that we have a further meeting, at an early date, in which together we would take up again that fundamental issue which was - maybe I'm being unfair in saying this, but I'll say it anyhow - to some degree fudged in 1985. In short, and our officials can get together as necessary in the meantime and draw up a detailed agenda, I would like to see an early Special Conference devoted exclusively to the reasons and justification for the existence and role of the UDR.
