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Discussion with John Hume 10th October, 1990

- John Hume telephoned from Strasbourg at lunch-time to say that he had just had a brief discussion with Ian Paisley, at the latter's initiative, about the talks process.
- 2. Paisley first referred to the <u>substantial progress</u> obstacle and said that the Unionist leadership would be prepared to accept Peter Brooke's definition of what this constituted. (The British had in fact indicated to us at a meeting earlier in the year that this was the position, but the implication at the time was that any such definition could not be used in a manner which would put Unionists in a publicly impossible position).
- 3. Secondly, Paisley said that the Unionists had told Peter Brooke that any talks with Dublin would have to be held in London. (This is a new and unacceptable pre-condition. It is also discouraging that the British did not mention it to us in the course of yesterday's briefing in the Secretariat on their meeting with the Unionists).
- 4. Hume will be arriving in Dublin from Strasbourg on Friday afternoon and will be staying overnight at the Grand Hotel in Malahide, where he will be addressing the week-end Conference of the Irish Association. He will be returning to Derry sometime on Saturday.
