ABOUT THE WOODROW WILSON CENTER

The man who has the time, the discrimination, and the sagacity to collect and comprehend the principal facts and the man who must act upon them must draw near to one another and feel that they are engaged in common enterprise.

he Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars is a presidential memorial that fosters scholarship and dialogue in the humanines and the social sciences. By bringing fellows from around the world to Washington, D.C., encouraging discourse among disciplines and professions, and publishing the results of these activities, the Center enriches the quality of knowledge and debate in the nation's capital and throughout the world.

The Woodrow Wilson Center, established by legislation in 1968 within the Smithsonian Institution, has an independent board of trustees and administration. The board is composed of citizen members, appointed by the President of the United States; seven U.S. government officials who serve by statute; and an additional representative from government appointed by the President.

The Wilson Council is a group of private citizens who advise and support the Center.

At the heart of the Woodrow Wilson Center are the fellows, who are selected through an annual international competition. Fellowship applications are evaluated with the assistance of outside Academic Councils. The fellows bring to Washington fresh insights on the historical, cultural, and political issues they are studying. In 1987–1988, seventy-one fellows and guest scholars from twenty-six countries were in residence at the Woodrow Wilson Center for varying periods.

Each fellow and guest scholar is associated with one of the Center's eight programs-American Society and Politics; Asia; East European; History, Culture, and Society: International Security Studies: Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies: Latin American: and West European-or the Media Studies Project. They provide the structure for the Center's active schedule of meetings. These gatherings might be informal lunchtime discussions of a fellow's research, dinner sessions with formal presentations and informal dialogue, or major international conferences. All of the gatherings are distinguished by the tradition of bringing together people who differ in discipline, profession, and nationality, but who share an interest in a subject and in having their views challenged in often-vigorous debate.

The Woodrow Wilson Center conducts an active program of publishing and outreach through The Wilson Center Press, the Woodrow Wilson Center Series with Cambridge University Press, the series of Scholars' Guides with Smithsonian Institution Press, The Wilson Quarterly, the monthly Calendar and Meeting Reports, Radio DIALOGUE, and the Center's series of "Congressional Breakfast" briefings.
