Duddy refused bail again on 27, 1, 90 remanded for a further two weeks.

Attempted murder of ROC officers Irish News during protests after the arrests of loyalists by the Stevens Inquiry.

John Miskelly, a soldier in the Royal Irish Rangers who was allegedly AWOL at the time the offences occurred. He was also charged along with a foraer soldier. Stephen Stewart, with two offences of hijacking on Oct. 10 1989.

His solr. Mr Paddy Donnelly, called for Miskelly to be remanded in military custody 'as is customary" in cases involving serving soldiers. An army officer testified that the army did not want to detain him in military custody. Donnelly argued that it would be dangerous to remand him to Crumlin Rd.. The Magistrate Nr. John Fyffe, refused to direct the Army to take him saying that a remand to military custody would only be appropriate where the alleged offence

occurred while on duty. Miskelly's High Court bail application was adjourned by Mr. Justice Higgins on 27. 2. 90 to find out if the Army would take custody of him.

Stevens Inquiry. Possession of documents relating to IRA suspects. The charges concerned posters put up around North Belfast on 4 Feb.

Loyalist. Donald Hodgen and John Adair.

There was no police objection to hail which was set at £100 of his own and £100 independent surety.

11.2.90 Telegraph Stevens Inquiry. Passing documents William McCarroll. on IRA suspects to the UPF in August of 1989.

Remanded in custody. Bail refused by High Court on 14, 2, 90, At bail hearing it emerged that McCarroll was the 'official photographer' for the UDA and the UPP. The photograph of Loughlin Magian given to the BBC after his nurder was traced to McCarroll who is said to have taken it from a videotape made of army material by loyalist paramilitaries. McCurroll was assaulted ( by republican prisoners acc. to press report.) in the course of disturbances at the prison on 13 May and he was later taken to hospital. He was granted bail of E500 in the High Court (LJ Kelly) on 22.5.90.

Making items of an RUC uniform available to the UFF and possession of two handquns in suspicious circumatances.

28.2.90 Collecting information of use to Telegraph terrorists. (Stevens Inquiry?)

UDA. William James Logan. who is said to have compiled detailed information on approx. 500 people said to have been members of "Republican Sinn Fein" in the Derry area. The names included those of John Joe Davey and Gerard Casey. The level of detail included the times people collected their children from school. The material is said to have originated from official sources - some from Army files.
