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# Ministerial Meeting Dublin, 31st May, 1991

- 1. The Secretary of State was accompanied by Minister & 6, 6, 7, Mawhinney, John Chilcot, Joe Pilling, Quentin Thomas, Robert Alston and Ambassador Fenn. Ministers Collins and Burke were accompanied by Noel Dorr, Dermot Gallagher, Declan O' Donovan and Anne Anderson.
- 2. The meeting began at noon with a tete-a-tete between Ministers and a separate meeting of officials. This was followed by lunch (separate lunches for Ministers and officials) and a plenary session of about one hour in the afternoon. A summary of the tete-a-tete is attached at Annex 1; the plenary session is reported below. A separate report is being circulated on the pre-lunch meeting of officials.

#### Plenary

- 3. The <u>Secretary of State</u> noted there was now a meeting of minds at official level on the Procedural Guidelines. He said he would take responsibility for seeking to persuade the Unionists to accept them. If there was any degree of alteration or amendment proposed by the Unionists, the British side would come back to us on Monday afternoon. It would obviously be helpful as a further milestone in the process if agreement could be announced on Monday on the Procedural Guidelines and the agenda for Strand One.
- 4. On the question of the identity of the Chairman, Mr. <u>Brooke</u> asked whether we wished to give a preliminary reaction to the nine names proposed by the Unionists. (Note: the Unionist letter Annex 2 had arrived via the British Embassy just before lunch). As to the <u>type</u> of Chairman who would be suitable, Mr. <u>Brooke</u> said there was a difference of

approach between the two sides - basically the Irish side wanted more of a household name than the British did. The British feel that the higher the profile of the candidate, the more difficult it will be to persuade him to take the job and - if he accepts - to prevent him from taking over the process.

- 5. Responding to the latter point, the <u>Minister</u> said that there was no question of anyone taking over the process because the agreed Procedural Guidelines would prevent this. As to the type of person required, we believe the process needed a Chairman of personal and political stature who would have credibility and authority. The person in question had to be able to preside over meetings whose participants might include a Head of Government. We did not necessarily require a household name but he or she had to be a respected figure, ideally with a political and possibly also a legal background a person who could not be pushed around by anyone and who would keep the process on an even keel.
- 6. Mr. Brooke asked what if we could not find such a person?
  Minister Burke said that finding a suitable person would
  surely not be beyond the joint capability of both
  Governments; both of us have extensive networks of
  Embassies which can be of assistance. Mr. Brooke said that
  the closer a person is to being a household name, the less
  likely he or she is to be available. The candidate would
  also need total fluency in English Raymond Barre, for
  example, while he could comfortably intervene in English in
  informal discussions among Community Ministers, would have
  difficulty in presiding in English over forty-two people.
  The language requirement almost inevitably drives us back to
  English-speaking countries.
- Minister <u>Collins</u> asked if the British side had specific names they wished to put to us. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> responded that

they had come with four names which he described as "similar in weight" to those put forward previously by them. The four individuals did not necessarily meet the criterion of being household names but they were people of experience and with a track record in their own fields. Picking up the Minister's earlier reference to legal expertise, he wondered if the Irish side might be happy with a lawyer who had some experience of public life?

- 8. Minister Collins reiterated that any Chairman must have authority and stature and must be able to command the respect of participants. A political background would help him to understand and relate to the participants in the process, who are themselves politicians. A political figure with some legal expertise would of course be very suitable.
- 9. Turning to the Unionist letter, Mr. <u>Brooke</u> said that the Unionists will press him on Monday for a reaction to their suggested names. Minister <u>Collins</u> said the response should be that the issue is too critical to give an immediate response. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> replied that he would then come under Unionist pressure as to when they can expect a reply. Minister <u>Collins</u> said that the question should not be entertained in these terms. The Unionists should be told that their suggestions will be given consideration by the two Governments in their overall search for a suitable Chairman. It was not simply a question of responding to Unionist suggestions that would amount to handing over the management of the process to the Unionist leaders.
- 10. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> repeated that he would come under pressure from the Unionists and from the media to indicate when the Governments would have a name. Minister <u>Collins</u> said that the Governments <u>had</u> found a name which the Unionists had then vetoed; in the context of the crucially important

nature of the process, the views of leader writers were not of particular consequence.

- 11. Pressed further by Mr. <u>Brooke</u> as to when we might react to the names suggested by the Unionists, Minister <u>Collins</u> said that we would probably be in a position to give considered views by the end of next week. We would also consider putting forward some further names of our own at that time.

  Mr. <u>Brooke</u> referred at this stage to the need for a joint deadline; Minister <u>Collins</u> responded that we had every intention of moving rapidly but there could be no question of a deadline the British side could be assured that we would have regard to the urgency of the situation in all its aspects.
- 12. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> then circulated the four British names: George Thomson, Robert Carr, Patrick Neill and Lord Blake (see Annex 3 attached). He said they wished to retain <u>Thomson's</u> name (which had been on an earlier list) because they felt he was particularly suitable by virtue of personality and also because of his Cabinet and EC Commission experience. He added that Robert <u>Carr</u> commanded very wide personal respect.
- 13. Minister Collins said that we would give very careful consideration to these names and would come back to the British side, possibly as indicated earlier putting forward other suggestions also. Minister Mawhinney mentioned that at one point John Hume had suggested Piet Dankert (now a junior Minister in the Dutch Government). Both Mr. Brooke and Minister Collins said that, leaving aside the question of suitability, they had no information as to Mr. Dankert's availability.
- 14. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> said that he would like to feel there would be a series of "running exchanges" between us next week on the question of a Chairman. If there is a long delay, there

will inevitably be questions about the timeframe (although he emphasised there can be no question of changing the Conference scheduled for July 16th). It was important that both sides show a sense of urgency about the task of finding a Chairman. Minister Collins said that we expected to have a presentation ready for the British side at the meeting of the Liaison Group next Friday (7 June). We would at that stage, as he had said, have given consideration to the various names submitted and perhaps put forward our own names. In the interim, we could touch base at official level on Tuesday and maintain contact during the week.

- 15. Mr. <u>Brooke</u> said that, for his part, there would be a "nervousness" if we do not have a meeting of minds on Friday. "We will be in reasonably general collective trouble". Minister <u>Collins</u> responded that the essential point was that the two Governments <u>had</u> agreed a name; the Unionists had disgraced themselves totally in turning down Lord Carrington and the DUP submission today is a kind of mea culpa exercise. However, we welcomed their submission for what it is.
- 16. The meeting concluded following some discussion of comments to be made to the press.

### Report by Ministers Collins and Burke on pre-lunch tete-a-tete

- 1. Minister Collins and Minister Burke said they had spoken at length about the pervasive mistrust and the poisonous atmosphere that now exists. It was extremely difficult to make progress in the full glare of publicity. A pause of up to two weeks would be helpful all round; the Unionists in particular need time to get their act together. The Unionists are trying to exercise a veto on a whole range of issues they are even trying indirectly to veto a meeting between the Taoiseach and the Prime Minister. Unionist vetoes had blocked political progress in Northern Ireland for eighty years; progress is only possible if the right of veto is removed from them.
- 2. Mr. Brooke and Dr. Mawhinney said there will inevitably be some delay in getting a Chairman and this will in effect constitute a natural pause. However, both Governments must continue their intensive efforts to find a suitable candidate. The person in question would have to be consulted before his name was put to the parties. The British side felt it might be desirable to agree on two names so as to have a second one in reserve.
- 3. Mr. Brooke and Mr. Mawhinney had emphasised their belief that Hume is very foolish to have moved away from Stormont this has given a propaganda weapon to the Unionists. Mr. Brooke added that he has had a personal education over the past five weeks about the problems of dealing with the Unionists. He heartily wished the 19 April document had been accepted and the Irish Government would then be able to see the difficulties at first hand! The real problem with Unionists is to "tie their heads and hearts together". One can convince them intellectually but their instincts and emotions pull them in a different direction.
