## Conversation with Rev. John Dunlop North Belfast, 9 April 1991.

## Summary

Rev. Dunlop is a Presbyterian Minister in North Belfast of strong unionist views. He made the following points about the talks:

- 1. Just before I met with him he had been at a Church meeting with 7 other Presbyterian Ministers. He had told them he would be meeting someone from Dublin and asked somewhat taken aback at the relatively hardline views is no business of Dublin what happens in Northern
- 2. His own sense is that Protestants accept that some sort of accommodation will have to be reached with Catholics in Northern Ireland. However, any institutionalised role for the Irish Government in the affairs of Northern of Protestants.
- 3. In approaching the talks he felt the Government, which has successfully reflected the sense of hurt of northern Catholics, should be careful to be sensitive to the genuine sense of hurt among northern Protestants. The insecurity and they are genuinely fearful of the future.
- 4. Like others, he saw the main virtue of any new settlement as being its potential for marginalising the Provos and "peace dividend" emerging from the process. To deliver policy of selective internment north and south.
