## All-Irish school for infants

Derry: A new all-Irish infants school will be open in the Shantallow area in the New Year, Cearta Gael announced yesterday.

The naiscoill intake of 10 to 15, it is hoped, will form the basis of a new infant class at the Gaelscoil Dhoire Cholm Cille, a short distance away.

Here, in a special all-Irish unit in Steelstown Primary, 25 youngsters are already educated in Irish only by Miss Majella Maynes.

Miss Roisih Bhreatnach, from Buncrana, will be in charge of the naiscoill, which will operate for three hours Monday to Friday.

Cearta Gael hope too that a second all-Irish unit will be set up at another large primary in the area during the coming year.

Meanwhile, the Irish Community School in Belfast's Shaws Road is to gain full recognition from the Department of Education, who have already ordered the publication of preliminary notices stating Belfast Education and Library Board's intention to grant the school maintained status.
