CULTURAL TRADITIONS GROUP: THE IRISH LANGUAGE

1. I have seen a copy of Maurna Crozier's letter suggesting the creation of an "Ultach Trust" to promote the Irish language.

2. The letter predates the Minister's announcement yesterday of the new position to be accorded to Irish in the school curriculum. Our response on this aspect could thus be on the lines of:

"You will be aware that Dr Mawhinney recently announced changes in the proposed Education Reforms legislation which will effectively enhance the status of Irish in the school curriculum. Irish will be on an equal footing with the four major EC working languages and parents will have a free choice of which language or languages their children should take. Indeed, this places Irish in the unique position of being the only language, apart from the major EC languages, capable of fulfilling the requirements of the new statutory curriculum."

3. The nature of the reply on the letter's main proposition will presumably be for decision elsewhere. From other papers I have seen, I take it that CCRU will have given the CTG to believe that their proposal is likely to fall on sympathetic ears.

THE PLACE OF THE IRISH LANGUAGE

We are writing, as individuals who have been involved in the work of the Cultural Traditions Group, to seek the Government's support for a new initiative on the place of the Irish language in Northern Ireland.

The Irish language is a very important part of our rich cultural heritage. Unfortunately, its place in Northern Ireland has become, and remains, a controversial issue. Although, in the past, Protestants both used, and were closely associated with the revival of, the language, most now either have no interest in it, or are alienated from it because of their perceptions of its association with the violent side of republicanism. To the minority community, the official attitude to the Irish language seems to be at best negative, and at worst hostile; the importance of the language to the nationalist identity is not perceived to be either properly understood, or respected.

As a consequence, we have seen specific Irish language issues, such as the status of the language in the new school curriculum, the prohibition of street names in Irish, the recognition of place-names in Irish, become so politicised, that it becomes very difficult for them to be discussed solely on their merits.

What we propose is the creation of a new charitable body - perhaps to be known as the 'Ultach Trust'. The Trust's main objectives would be:

- To widen appreciation of the contribution of the Irish language to . 1. the cultural heritage of Northern Ireland.
- To increase knowledge of the language throughout the community. 2.
- To assist in the provision of written and oral material which will 3. help to promote the wider use of the language.

We believe that Government commitment to provide a substantial level of support on a continuing basis - perhaps £100,000 per year would provide clear evidence of Government's willingness to respect the place of the Irish language in Northern Ireland.

We are writing directly to you as we believe the place of the Irish language in Northern Ireland is a very broad issue which does not fall within the remit of any particular Department. We would be happy to discuss our proposal with you or with any Member of your Ministerial team.
