CALL ON THE PRIME MINISTER BY JAMES KILFEDDER MP

Thank you for your letter of 12 February reporting Mr Kilfedder's call on the Prime Minister. You asked for advice on his suggestion that we might seek to persuade the Catholic Church to excommunicate PIRA terrorists.

Our understanding is that the Catholic Church has considered this possibility but is determined not to go down the path of excommunication. This is partly for theological reasons, to which we would expect Cardinal Daly, as a theological conservative, to subscribe. The Church is thought also to judge that excommunication would have little or no greater effect on PIRA activists than the existing clerical condemnations of violence. A further point although not one which the Church itself has made, so far as we know - is that as a practical matter it would be extremely difficult for individual parish priests to withhold communion from particular individuals simply on the ground that they might be, or were rumoured to be, active PIRA members.

The Catholic Church has instead concentrated on condemnations of violence. Cardinal Daly's trenchant attacks on terrorists from all sections of the community are well known, and have greatly helped the Government in a number of ways - for instance in persuading some instinctively "green" sections of Irish American opinion that the terrorists are not freedom fighters. The present Pope powerfully denounced terrorism at Drogheda in 1979, and has repeated these denunciations on a number of recent occasions, most notably last December when he described Northern Ireland violence as "sinful and unjustifiable" and as "the expression of outmoded political and social positions".

The Church has also in recent years largely succeeded in preventing paramilitary displays at funerals on church premises, a most welcome development from our point of view.

As far as we can establish the Government has made no recent representations to the Catholic Church about excommunication of PIRA terrorists. Our assessment is that we would be unlikely to be successful if we sought to persuade the Church to change its position, that even the most carefully handled representations might not be well received, and that little would be added in practical terms to the effect of the existing clerical condemnations of terrorist violence.
